In 1972 the price of crude oil was about \$3. 00 per barrel and by the end of 1974 the price of oil had risen by a factor of 4 to over \$12. 00. This resulted in one of the worst recessions in the post World War II era. As a result, there was a movement in the United States to become energy independent. At that time the United States imported about one third of its oil (about five million barrels per day). After the embargo was lifted, the world chose to ignore the "wake-up call" and went on with business as usual.
